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# Contemporary South Asia: Emerging Trends and Voices

The Asian Studies Development Program was initiated in 1990 by the East-West Center and University of Hawai'i. Its mission is to infuse Asian content and perspectives into the core curriculum at American two-year and four-year colleges and universities. The ASDP network now includes more than 400 colleges in 49 states, with 20 schools designated as ASDP regional centers.

Middlesex Community College was involved in the early development of ASDP and was the first institution to become a regional center. Over two decades, Middlesex and ASDP have collaborated in organizing ASDP workshops and conferences. This seminar, which highlights the cultural complexities of South Asia with special attention to the globally strategic areas of India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan, focuses on the social, political, and economic roles these countries play in their region and throughout the world, and is indicative of the importance of promoting international education.

## PRESENTERS:



**Zia Mian** is the director of the Project on Peace and Security in South Asia, at the Program on Science and Global Security at Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, Princeton University. His research interests include nuclear weapons and nuclear energy policy in South Asia, and issues of nuclear disarmament and peace. Previously, he has taught at Yale University and Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad. He has worked at the Union of Concerned Scientists, Cambridge (Mass.), and at the Sustainable Development Policy Institute, Islamabad. He is Associate Editor of *Science & Global Security*, an international journal for peer-reviewed scientific and technical studies relating to arms control, disarmament and nonproliferation policy. In addition to his scholarly articles, he is the editor of several books and has helped make two documentary films on peace and security in South Asia. He has a Ph.D. in physics from the University of Newcastle upon Tyne.



**Tarun Khanna** is the Jorge Paulo Lemann Professor at the Harvard Business School and Faculty Chair for HBS activities in India. He serves on the boards of the AES Corporation, a global power company; SKS Microfinance, India's largest microfinance firm; Parliamentary Research Services, a non-partisan NGO research input to India's Members of Parliament; and Primary Source, a Boston-based NGO dedicated to helping US K-12 schools adopt curricular material reflecting global societies. In 2007, Professor Khanna was nominated to be a Young Global Leader (under 40) by the World Economic Forum. In 2009, he was elected a Fellow of the Academy of International Business. He is the author of numerous articles in scholarly journals and anthologies and editor of several economics and management journals. His recent books include: *Billions of Entrepreneurs: How China and India are Reshaping Their Futures and Yours* (2008) and *Winning in Emerging Markets: A Roadmap for Strategy and Execution* (March 2010).



**Sankaran Krishna** is Professor and past chair of Political Science at the Public Policy Center at the University of Hawai'i, Manoa. His research centers on nationalism, ethnic identity and conflict, identity politics, and post-colonial studies, located primarily around India and Sri Lanka. He has published numerous articles that cover the partition of the Indian subcontinent in 1947, the culture of Indian foreign policy making, the silent presence of race in discourses of international relations, and the diasporic forms of Indian nationalism. His books include: *Postcolonial Insecurities: India, Sri Lanka, and the Question of Nationhood*; *India's Role in Sri Lanka's Ethnic Conflict (A History of Ethnic Conflict in Sri Lanka)*; and *Globalization and Postcolonialism: Hegemony and Resistance in the Twenty-first Century* (2009).
